

# Polynesian Panthers

### 50th Anniversary

Migrating in the thousands in the 1950s, Pacific Islanders made Aotearoa their home while bolstering the country's workforce and communities. And yet they faced racism, marginalisation, and the notorious dawn raids of the 1970s. This largely forgotten history spurred an important political movement - the Polynesian Panthers, founded on Keppel Street in Ponsonby in June 1971 by six young Pacific Island men: Fred Schmidt, Nooroa Teavae, Paul Dapp, Vaughan Sanft, Eddie Williams and Will 'Ilolahia. Fifty years later, we reflect on their work of political activism: running food coops and homework centres, advocating for tenants, promoting Pacific languages, and distributing a free legal book on dealing with the police, written for the Panthers by a young lawyer named David Lange.

We honour the 50th anniversary of the Polynesian Panthers and their enormous legacy of revolution, change, massive artistic influence, and lineage of Pasifika artists. This packed programme includes a powerful and insightful exhibition on the dawn raids in New Zealand and the emergence of the Polynesian Panthers during these turbulent times; the making and completion of a mural project inspired by the Polynesian Panthers' ongoing relationship with Emory Douglas and the Black Panther Party; a presentation of Oscar Kightley's Dawn Raids play; and a celebration of one of Pasifika's finest pioneering artists, Che-Fu, the son of Polynesian Panthers activist and reggae musician, Tigilau Ness. Along with some of his musician friends, Tigi will give a free concert in Aotea Square ahead of Che-Fu's concert on Saturday 13 March.

### The Dawn Raids – Educate to Liberate

Documenting the courageous activities of the Polynesian Panthers and their fight for social justice, *The Dawn Raids* - *Educate to Liberate* highlights and acknowledges the group's place in the social and cultural history of Aotearoa.

Using the setting of a typical 1970s Pacific Island family lounge room to look back at the dawn raid activities in New Zealand, the exhibition features original artworks; memorabilia and photographs from the dawn raid era; and informative, historical perspectives of the events drawn from extensive research and personal interviews undertaken by Pauline (Vaeluaga) Smith, whose award-winning book *My New Zealand Story: Dawn Raid*, published by Scholastic New Zealand in 2018, inspired the exhibition.

Two New Zealand documentaries, Dawn Raids (2005) and Polynesian Panthers (2010), will also screen in the gallery alongside these works.



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### Pouwātū: Active Presence

Celebrating the dynamic 40-year career of tohunga whakaahua (photographer) John Miller (Ngāpuhi), *Pouwātū* is a statement of active presence. This exhibition is a collaboration with kaihoahoa whare (architect) **Elisapeta** Heta (Ngātiwai, Waikato Tainui).

Best known for his documentation of radical protest, Miller's photography documents Māori people, culture and communities from the inside. An alternative history to the dominant narrative: they document candid images of people from everyday occurrences to significant moments, at Rātana Pā, Māori Women's Welfare League hui, and gatherings of the Polynesian Panthers.

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### Educate to Liberate – Panthers Mural

A story of revolution through dance, this electrifying production explores one of history's most fascinating mass movements – the dancing plague of 1518.

Living in poverty and under the rule of the patriarchy, the people of Strasbourg revolted one summer against oppression by taking to the streets. No ordinary protest, their uprising was a fever of dance on a scale never seen before – nor again – that lasted for months. Depicted as collective madness in painting and folklore, this pulsating dance-theatre work interprets events from the inside out, revisioning them not as an illness but catharsis. Featuring the legendary Michael Parmenter and a cast of stunning New Zealand dancers, *Strasbourg 1518* combines exhilarating original music and choreography into a frenzied tale of anarchy, physicality and the power of art as resistance.
