



About the Company

About the Show

Woven from the threads of a sweeping family epic, *A Place in the Sultan's Kitchen* is a charming, funny and moving fusion of theatre and good food.

Creator Josh Hinton fills the room with music, stories and exotic smells as he attempts to make his grandmother's chicken curry, live on stage (and you get to eat it). Through childhood memories and family folklore he transports us from the backstreets of Sri Lanka to a bustling India, from a schoolyard in Iran to a South African farm, to his home in Wollongong.

It's a show for anyone who's searched for where they belong in this world, who's lived between different cultures, or who has loved and lost family.





From the Writer

The show began as an exploration of my cultural identity, through stories of my grandmother in Iran and India. As writing progressed, I realised quite quickly that I couldn't accurately explore this without looking at all the different parts of my family — the numerous cultures and beliefs.

While what has ended up on the stage is just a fraction of these stories, one thing has become quite clear — who I am, and who I'm becoming, is a reflection of all of these people, memories and experiences.

Along the journey of making the show, I've also realised that so many people in our Australian society share this experience of living between different cultures, not necessarily feeling like they totally belong in one.

Leland Kean is the Artistic Development Manager for Merrigong Theatre Company.

He has over 25 years professional experience as a Director, Producer,

Designer, Dramaturg, Curator and Arts Manager. Prior to joining Merrigong in 2015, Leland was the Artistic Director of the Tamarama Rock Surfers Theatre Company.

During his decade long tenure with the Rock Surfers he programmed and produced over 100 new Australian works and established both the Old Fitzroy and Bondi Pavilion Theatres. Since graduating from the NIDA director's course in 1997, his career has been committed to the development and production of new Australian work and artists. He has directed and produced

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premieres and productions of the work of many of Australia's most prominent writers including Suzie Miller, Sue Smith, Alana Valentine, Kay Proudlove, Brendan Cowell, Toby Schmitz, Aiden Fennessey, Tim Minchin, Travis Cotton, Stephen Carlton, John AD Fraser, David Williamson, Tim Baker, Lachlan Philpott and Drew Fairley.

For Merrigong he has directed productions of *Lost Boys*, 2018; *The Surfer and the Mermaid*, 2019; *Dear Diary* and *As Luck Would Have It*, 2022; *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, 2023; *A Place in the Sultan's Kitchen (Or How to Make the Perfect One-Pot Chicken Curry)*, 2024; and *Yandha Djanbay (Go Slowly)*, 2025. He produced the national tour of *Letters to Lindy* in 2018 and has driven the development of Merrigong's The Strangeways Ensemble and Merrigong's artist development programme MERRIGONGX.

Ko ngā mahinga toi whānui me te ahurea ki Tāmaki Makaurau o nāianei te pūmanawa o te Ahurei.





